FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK...



Tēnā koutou e te whānau o Bruce Points from our: McLaren Intermediate School Teacher Evening

Our learning compass here at BMIS is centred on the concept of 'whānau'. You will often hear me refer to our groups of classes as whānau, to our community as 'whānau' and to our kura as 'whānau'. Whānau, aiga, fāmili, pamilya, kazoku are just some of the terms when translated mean family. Learning here for your child means just that, that we are an extension to your family as you are to ours. Every student belongs to many facets of our BMIS whānau to ensure that their needs are met, that they feel safe and that they have safe adults to turn to when they encounter a challenge they require support

To make learning fun, purposeful and encourage a sense of belonging. Our classes are organised into groups - their whānau - Whānau Manaaki: Rm 1, Rm 2, Rm 3; Whānau Manawanui: Rm 4, Rm 5, Rm 6 and Whānau Atawhai: Rm 11, Rm 12 - Ola Finafinau, Rm 13. Each name represents one of our 5 C's which are our core values: Manaaki - Care, Manawanui -Commitment and Atawhai -Courtesy. We also have 2 more whānau made up of other important areas of our kura: Specialist Subjects - Whānau Atamai - Common Sense and our Pastoral Care - Whānau Mahi Tahi - Co-operation.

Each whānau has a specific colour given to them that represents the colours of Bruce McLaren cars: Manaaki - silver, Manawanui - yellow, Atawhai - green, Atamai - black and Mahi Tahi - red.

Our whole kura is one big offer, a p whānau/family but broken down into small extended families. We have events that are centred around our whānau to enhance this sense of belonging such as kura hakinakina - school sport, whānau points where all ākonga can contribute towards.

Points from our: Meet the Teacher Evening, keeping chromebooks tidy, keeping our environments tidy, getting to school on time, kura hakinakina, recycling, family visits to Seesaw are just a few areas where we encourage our ākonga to be responsible for in our kura whānau. Each whānau has their own chant that they have created led by their whānau leaders. It is quite the spectacle to watch.

We do 'sweat the small important stuff' here at BMIS to ensure that if these are met then the bigger things just fall into place and we couldn't do it without you, our whānau community. So thank you for supporting us with ensuring that your child, our ākonga, attends school everyday, arrive to school on time, that they wear their school uniform correctly and with pride, that they complete their learning work at home and that you are present with their learning; attending our 3 Way Conferences, our hui and taking the time to check your liking Seesaw child's commenting on their work. Together as one big extended whānau/family we can certainly make learning here at BMIS for your child, our ākonga an experience where learning is a priority, that they feel a sense of belonging, that they feel a sense of achievement, that they feel proud and confident so that they can always DREAM, BELIEVE, **ACHIEVE**





GENERAL

- •SHOPS: (Opposite School) Due to the volume of traffic in the shop carpark, trucks with supplies for the shops coming and going, the entrance and exit being the same driveway for all shops, we STRONGLY ENCOURAGE parents to find another space to collect your children from.
- •For the safety of our students, they are only to enter the shops with an adult. No adult - no entry. Safety first
- always. Thank you for your support with this.
- •Lollies, sweets, chewing gum, fizzy and sports drinks are not part of our BMIS ethos.
- •BMIS prides itself on the standard of school uniform worn by our students along with appropriate language and behaviour. Nothing less is acceptable.

PEDESTRIAN CROSSING:

•Students only cross the road ONCE to come to school and ONCE going home from school. This is to be at the PEDESTRIAN CROSSING.

PARKING AT SCHOOL:

•Just a reminder that there is to be NO PARKING IN THE BUS BAY - this is for buses only. If you are picking your child up from school, please park in one of the side streets and arrange for your child to walk the short distance to meet you. The shops' carpark opposite the school is not ideal due to traffic congestion, pedestrian traffic and delivery of vehicles.

OFF AT THE GATE:

•We would encourage that devices be left at home, that your child is away from their device for the day. If there is a need to have their device, a discussion with your child about OFF AT THE GATE is imperative. When entering school, students are to turn devices off as they enter the school gates and turn them on again as they leave the school gates at the end of the day. All home devices are placed in a class box at 8.30am and returned by 3.00pm. Students, when entering school, are to get off bicycles, scooters, skateboards and skates at the school gate for everyone's safety. No helmet - no ride. Please support the school in safeguarding everyone.

ATTENDANCE:

•If a student misses one day of school every two weeks, they miss a whole year of school by 16 years of age. Together we play a key role in building strong habits of regular school attendance. That our ākonga, your child or children attend school every day and engage in learning as every school day matters. You must let us know if your child or children are going to be absent for a day or intends to be absent for a portion of the school term for whatever reason, like a tangi or medical procedure.

Family holidays or taking time off for extracurricular activities (not organised by school) are not acceptable reasons for being absent.

Let's work together to see if we can get 1 or more of our classes over the 95% mark so that we can have Mr Whippy onsite.
