



Across the country, communities are getting excited about the first ever celebration of Matariki as a public holiday.

Some iwi name this time of year Puanga because they're not able to see Matariki clearly from their locality. They look to the next important star near Matariki – Puanga.

Matariki, including Puanga, have traditionally been celebrated with several important themes. These themes have guided the creation of our learning resources.

These themes are:

- Reflection: remembering loved ones who have passed on, especially within the past lunar year
- Celebration: celebrating the bounty and blessings of the present
- Aspiration: setting aspirations to ensure that that bounty can continue long into the future with a focus on environmental protection and regeneration.
