Student Reflection

What have you learnt and improved on in math this term for number knowledge?

In math, I learned about the x and y axes. I learned that x is on the top of the vertical αx is, and y is on the horizontal αx is. When plotting points, you always start with the horizontal (x) before the vertical (y). I also learned how to round numbers to the nearest ones, tens, hundreds, and even up to the hundred thousands and beyond.

What have you learnt and improved on in math this term for patterns and relationships?

In patterns, I learned about important terms like corners, vertices, and sides, which are used to describe the parts of shapes. Corners are where two sides meet, and vertices are another word for corners. Sides are the edges that make up the shape. I also practiced recognizing patterns in counting. For example, if you start with the numbers 10, 14, and 18, the pattern is adding 4 each time. Understanding patterns helps me see how numbers or shapes follow specific rules, and it's a fun way to solve problems

What have you learnt and improved on in math this term for position & orientation?

In compass directions, I learned about North, East, South, West, NE, SE, SW, and NW. I learned that if it says North, you go up because North is at the top of the compass. To remember the directions, I use the saying "Never Eat Soggy Weetbix." The compass has helped me understand where to go, like when looking for treasure. I also learned how to plot coordinates. You start with the horizontal (x-axis) first and then the vertical (y-axis), which is the opposite of what I used to do. Mr. Kelly taught me that you always start with the horizontal before the vertical.

I feel like I am a 5 because doing math has been so much fun! It has also helped me build confidence with the people in my math class because we are all at the same level.

I have really focused on math, so I give myself a 5 because going from 49% to 88% is a big jump, and I am really proud of myself for that progress.



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

...that is BULLYING







