Getting our Race Plan Right!

Tēna koutou ki te whānau o Bruce McLaren Intermediate School

The Autumn season is officially here and just like that, so is the mid-point of our kura's first term. The focus of our mahi over the first month has been about laying the foundations for the year ahead. Our ākonga with their kaiako have been establishing expectations and structures with their learning and building relationships with each other, with their whānau.

They have set up their student workbooks and online platforms - Seesaw, Education Perfect and Maths Buddy. The expectation here at BMIS is that our ākonga work 50% in their student workbooks and 50% online. All whānau should now be connected to their child's class on Seesaw and should be able to see real learning, time homework coupled with notices from kaiako.

You should have received via Seesaw your child's My Personal Best Learner Profile. This profile shows your child's effort towards their Personal Best for their learning. This is about progress relating to their personal excellence. Ākonga are encouraged to regularly reflect on these criteria and to plan their next steps.

The first term's sports season is well underway with our BMIS Girls Softball participating in the Western Zone Girls Softball tournament earlier this week and tag rugby now practicing for their later in tournament on the term.

Fitness is an integral part of our PΕ programme with fitness circuits and the beep test being implemented in classrooms. Hakinakina - School Sport is also up and running with whānau ākonga teams competing every Friday in a variety of games, with their whānau chants hoping to be the winning whānau of the week.

Ākonga are now making decisions around their opportunities for this first half of the semester, which may include possibly committing to a year long cultural group - Kapahaka, Samoan, Tongan, Cook Island or a Performing Arts group - Showquest, McLaren Voices, Band to name a few.

For many of our akonga especially our Year 7's and those Year 8's new to our kura, these decisions and new systems may prove demanding at first but with the support of their kaiako, their peers and other staff, their ability to make choices for their learning becomes easier due to these foundations that have been established in this first month. It is important to us that our ākonga get their race plan right from the beginning so that they feel a sense of success at different points and that they feel supported and safe as they begin independently take hold of their journey.



Week 5 - Whānau for the Week - Whānau Manaaki



GENERAL

- Black sandals are to be worn in Term 1 & 4.
- SHOPS: (Opposite School) Due to the volume of traffic in the shop carpark, trucks with supplies for the shops coming and going, the entrance and exit being the same driveway for all shops, we STRONGLY ENCOURAGE parents to find another space to collect your children from.
- For the safety of our students, they are only to enter the shops with an adult. No adult - no entry. Safety first - always. Thank you for your support with this.
- Lollies, sweets, chewing gum, fizzy and sports drinks are not part of our BMIS ethos.
- BMIS prides itself on the standard of school uniform worn by our students along with appropriate language and behaviour. Nothing less is acceptable.

PEDESTRIAN CROSSING:

Students only cross the road ONCE to come to school and ONCE going home from school. This is to be at the PEDESTRIAN CROSSING.

PARKING AT SCHOOL:

Just a reminder that there is to be NO PARKING IN THE BUS BAY - this is for buses only. If you are picking your child up from school, please park in one of the side streets and arrange for your child to walk the short distance to meet you. The shops' carpark opposite the school is not ideal due to traffic congestion, pedestrian traffic and delivery of vehicles.

OFF AT THE GATE:

We would encourage that devices be left at home, that your child is away from their device for the day. If there is a need to have their device, a discussion with your child about OFF AT THE GATE is imperative. When entering school, students are to turn devices off as they enter the school gates and turn them on again as they leave the school gates at the end of the day. All home devices are placed in a class box at 8.30am and returned by 3.00pm. Students, when entering school, are to get off bicycles, scooters, skateboards and skates at the school gate for everyone's safety. No helmet - no ride. Please support the school in safeguarding everyone.

ATTENDANCE:

If a student misses one day of school every two weeks, they miss a whole year of school by 16 years of age. Together we play a key role in building strong habits of regular school attendance. That our ākonga, your child or children attend school every day and engage in learning as every school day matters. You must let us know if your child or children are going to be absent for a day or intends to be absent for a portion of the school term for whatever reason, like a tangi or medical procedure.

Family holidays or taking time off for extracurricular activities (not organised by school) are not acceptable reasons for being absent.

Let's work together to see if we can get 1 or more of our classes over the 95% mark so that we can have Mr Whippy onsite.

DIGITAL SAFETY

Prospect Primary School have kindly offered to all schools in our Kahui Ako - Community of Learning, the opportunity to attend a presentation on digital safety on Wednesday, 10th April 2024 from 6.30 pm to 8.30 pm. It will be free for all families to attend. Prospect Primary School will be sending information about how to book via Event Finder closer to the date so please watch this space.

The presentation is a hard-hitting, eye-opening and often hilarious In-person "Parent Cyber Safety Evening" presented by Filmmaker, Author and Speaker Rob Cope and also includes a one-year subscription to their new online educational film series for our students.

The "Parent Cyber Safety Evening" covers the following:

- Cyberbullying How bullies can reach our kids 24/7
- Social media How social media is affecting the mental health in 3 out of 5 children. FOMO, depression, anxiety.
- Gaming and the developing brain An oversupply of dopamine leading to dopamine deficiency, synaptic pruning, and the underdevelopment of social skills and empathy
- Naked Selfies The pressure to send nudes from intermediate up through high school
- Online predators The methods they use, how to spot them.
- Online porn vs healthy sexuality How consuming online pornography as a child or teen can create a sexual template where violence, aggression, and dominance are seen as normal and consent can become very blurry

- Filters Which filters are best and how to install them
- Smartphones How to lock down a smartphone to make it a safe phone
- Boundaries How to put good boundaries in place around device use
- 3 golden rules The 3 golden rules that will keep your kids safe
- Talking to your kids How to have difficult conversations with your kids
- Challenging our own phone and device usage -Reconnecting as a family
