held regarding ATHLETICS DAY so your child will be well informed about the event.

Students are required to compete in at least one track event and three field events to gain a 'participation certificate' and an 'athlete certificate' will be awarded to those who achieve a 1, 2, 3 placing in a final event for at least three events. Trainer/sneaker shoes are to be worn by all students. NO spikes are worn by any student – this is a school day not a national track meet.

Douglas Track and Field Centre (Trust Stadium field) is an all weather venue so we will be going rain, hail or shine. The staff will have a team ready for the relay races (yet to be discussed!) so a parent relay team is always an option – happy training.

MEASLES - A DANGEROUS ILLNESS:

From Roald Dahl: Olivia, my eldest daughter, caught measles when she was seven years old. As the illness took its usual course I can remember reading to her often in bed and not feeling particularly alarmed about it. Then one morning, when she was well on the road to recovery, I was sitting on her bed showing her how to fashion little animals out of coloured pipecleaners, and when it came to her turn to make one herself, I noticed that her fingers and her mind were not working together and she couldn't do anything.

"Are you feeling all right?" I asked her.

"I feel all sleepy," she said.

In an hour, she was unconscious. In 12 hours she was dead.

The measles had turned into a terrible thing called measles encephalitis and there was nothing the doctors could do to save her. That was twenty-four years ago in 1962, but even now, if a child with measles happens to develop the same deadly reaction from measles as Olivia did, there would still be nothing the doctors could do to help her.

On the other hand, there is today something that parents can do to make sure that this sort of tragedy does not happen to a child of theirs. They can insist that their child is immunised against measles. I was unable to do that for Olivia in 1962 because in those days a reliable measles vaccine had not been discovered. Today a good and safe vaccine is available to every family and all you have to do is to ask your doctor to administer it.

I dedicated two of my books to Olivia, the first was 'James and the Giant Peach'. That was when she was still alive. The second was 'The BFG', dedicated to her memory after she had died from measles. You will see her name at the beginning

of each of these books. And I know how happy she would be if only she could know that her death had helped to save a good deal of illness and death among other children.
